WHAT'S NEW IN KMU?

There is nothing more inspiring than to watch young children responding to music in new and creative ways. Musica Viva or La musica è viva (Music is Life) was a project that was sponsored by the Music Performance Trust Fund in the latter part of 2018. The goals were:

- to provide the schools with three contrasting interactive performances in their own school,
- To help the teacher create resources that prepared the class for each performance
- To explore each style of music with a in-class performer in preparation for each concert,
- To integrate music into other subjects e.g. history, literacy, science, etc.

This project would not have been successful without a team of dedicated musicians, facilitators, and educators. With Trevor Strong leading the music in the classroom and our three contrasting bands, the team was able to pull off an amazing experience for both the children and teachers involved. The money that we have received from MPTF to run the Musica Viva project gave a 5/6 class plus an entire school an experience that they will remember for a lifetime. For many of these children, this was their first that they experienced a live performance. The rock concert at the end of the project was an enormous hit!. Member Focus Steve Smith (Life Member)

Steve Smith has been an active musician since 1967. In 1968 he joined a band called *The Sands of Time*. At the same time, he also joined the union. A singer, and a drummer, Steve began his musical studies taking classical piano lessons as a child for 8 years with the *Royal Conservatory of Music*.

After joining *The Sands of Time*, the band released their first single in May of 1970 called *I've got a feeling* which reached # 2 on the Canadian charts and top ten in the United States. During this time, the band went on tour in both Canada and the United States. The group disbanded in 1972 where Steve turned to play with a couple of local bands to make a living.

In 1978 The Sands of Time re-



formed under the name *Bent-wood Rocker* and have been together ever since. They have recorded at Criteria Studios in Miami, and while there, met the Bee Gees. The album *Take me to* Heaven did very well in Europe but missed out to secure a US deal due to the emergence and popularity of Disco in 1981. The band has recently released a 3-disc album *Take 1, 2 and 3* which can be heard on Spotify and CBC music.



In 1999 Steve joined a Beatles tribute band called *All you need is Love.* Over the past 20 years, This band still performs today and has toured in Europe, the US, and Canada.

The last 20 years has been one that has seen Steve working with both bands:

"It has been an amazing 20 year ride .. I still work on original material with Brentwood Rocker. All you need is Love have played, in particular, the Cavern Club in Liverpool."

During 2006, 2007 and 2008. All you need is Love played in MONS, Belgium at the Shape NATO Base and over the years have performed in Boston, New York, Philly, Miami, Palm Springs and San Francisco. In 2017 and 2018 they were asked to play on the 70's Rock and Romance



Cruise out of Fort Lauderdale with many big name bands from that era: AMERICA, STYX, CHRISTOPHER CROSS and WAR just to name a few. In 2020 the band plans to return for a third time in February of that year.

Steve has a long career of experience and summing up his own career he had this to say.

" This is a tough business and fortunately I attended university.. And earned a BSC degree, which helped me get a iob with the Ontario Government in 1986 as a youth probation Officer. I have since retired from this job, in 2011, and now devote my time to music. I have never stopped playing, but it is very difficult to make a good living these days from music. Although I have always encouraged young musicians to pursue their music dreams, I also stress the importance of a decent education to fall back on." Steve Smith

The highlight was definitely writing their own original songs and having the chance to perform them with Trevor and their peers in the classroom. The pitch for their imaginary band brought out creativity and language skills that left us wanting to sign them all up to play at the 'staged' festival.

We won the jackpot when we were given the chance to participate in this grant and the benefits and positive impact of the grant on our class are still being felt and heard each and every day. The ability for the musicians to come and share the joy music brings them, their journeys in music and their interests in specific areas demonstrated that music is everywhere and intertwined in all areas of life. Students have shown interest in learning an instrument, attending different concerts and productions, singing on their own and still love to make music using items in the classroom at indoor recesses. Their appreciation for the time and dedication needed to master an instrument and the perseverance needed to succeed in performing is evident.

I am so grateful to the Kingston Musicians Union and the Music Performance Trust Fund for making it possible for the Grade 5 / 6 class at Winston Churchill Public School to truly experience that music is life. Our learning time with Trevor and the musicians flew by but we will always remember this incredible experience. It would be amazing for other classes to be able to access this music enrichment as well.

Please do not give the price list out to members of the public . This document is for our members only. It is not a guide for the engager for employing or paying musicians at a set rate. The price List establishes the minimum working conditions and wage scales, which serve as a basis for the negotiation of fees. Musicians are obliged to respect at least the minimum scale and a musician may at any time negotiate a fee that is superior to those stipulated in the document by taking into account his/her experience and fame, the equipment and/or instruments he/she supplies, living, travel and equipment transportation expenses. The price list only applies to the jurisdiction of Local 518. The price list also determines our pension rates. All pension rates are based on the rates in this document. You can find a copy of this document in the members area of the website or by contacting the office. Handing out this document risks your ability to negotiate fair payment.
